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International Conference on 'Engendering Democracy in South Asia: Issues and Challenges'



The Department of Political Science, School of Social Sciences organised a two-day International Conference on 'Engendering Democracy in South Asia: Issues and Challenges'on 22nd and 23rd May at the Conference Hall. The Conference was attended by over 23 participants representing various universities and colleges from India including three participants from Tribhuvan University, Kathmandu, Nepal.

The Inaugural session began with the welcome address by Dr.Durga P. Chhetri, Head of the Department and Conference Convenor. The welcome address provided a broad canvas for the need to deliberate on the problem of engendering democracy in South Asia and the need to identify the points of convergence and divergence in the experiences of South Asian neighbours. Addressing the gathering, Prof. Tanka BahadurSubba, Vice Chancellor, Sikkim University emphasized on the relevance of the theme of the seminar in the South Asian context with its rich civilizational history and varied experiences. The highlight of the Inaugural Session was the Keynote



Address by Prof. Samir Kumar Das, Former Vice Chancellor, University of North Bengal and presently Dean, Calcutta University. Using Delueze and Guattari's concept of migrant andnomad, Prof. Das looked at the problem of macro and molecular politics from theeyes of a kidnapped girl from somewhere in Midnapore, West Bengal.

In the plenary session, Prof. Lok Raj Baral, Professor& Executive Chairman, Nepal Center of Contemporary Studies, Kathmandu, Nepal shared the trials and tribulations of Nepal's tryst with democracy. Speaking emotionally in the backdrop of the recent devastating earthquake in Nepal, he highlighted the socio-economic and political problems that have held back Nepal from charting a path of political development. Against this broad template set by Prof. Samir Kumar Das and Prof. Baral, the technical sessionstook up the theoretical issues concerning democracy vis- a-vis its specific experiences by the women, adivasis, tribals and also

Three-Day Intra-school Inter-disciplinary National Seminar on 'Trends in Contemporary Literature: Issues and Perspectives'



The School of Languages and Literature, Sikkim University organized a three-day intra-school inter-disciplinary national seminar, in collaboration with ICSSR-NERC, Shillong and Sahitya Akademi, New Delhi on 'Trends in Contemporary Literature: Issues and Perspectives' from 29-31 May, 2015. This national seminar was the first such initiative undertaken by the School of Languages and Literature, in bringing together all the four departments of languages namely, Chinese, English, Hindi and Nepali, under one umbrella, and in organizing an academic festival, conducive for mutual interactions and exchanges amongst the various literatures of the world.

The seminar was graced by a galaxy of distinguished scholars and eminent poets, like Professor Anisur Rahman, Professor Amina K. Ansari, Professor Ipshita Chanda, Dr. N R Singh and Dr. Rajendra Bhandari.

Professor Ipshita Chanda from the Department of Comparative Literature, Jadavpur University, Kolkata delivered the keynote address and Professor Anisur Rahman, Professor at the Department of English, Jamia Millia Islamia, New Delhi delivered the valedictory speech.

The central objective of this national seminar was to create a platform for young researchers from all fields of literature and to further invite them over for conversation, discussion, interaction, and exchange. In the midst of exploring the ecology of ideas and sensibilities, crosscurrents and parallels in literary texts, and while acknowledging the growing affinity of literature and literary studies with the social sciences in

the form of inter-disciplinarity, this three-day intraschool inter-disciplinary national seminar could most importantly reach out to many a young mind within and outside of the state of Sikkim.

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Workshop on

'A Psycho Social Inquiry into Suicide, Suggestions and Interventions'

In the light of the rising rates of suicide in Sikkim and in response to increasing concerns, the Sikkim University, Department of Sociology (Sikkim University) in collaboration with Department of Health and Family Welfare (Government of Sikkim) held a workshop titled "A Psycho Social Inquiry into Suicide, Suggestions and Interventions" on 28th and 29th of May 2015.





Since suicide is being recognized as an urgent problem that needs to be addressed, a workshop by Sikkim University in partnership with other stakeholders was a very timely, and an important first step in understanding and tackling the problem. It was a strategic coordination and needs assessment workshop to identify resources and bring together the main actors and organizations involved to assess research and interventions needed to ameliorate the situation. It engaged local state organisations and actors already dealing with the issue, and external organisations and agencies such as the Ambedkar University in Delhi, NGOs and other professional psychological organisations.

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The International Biodiversity Day: A Brief Report

The United Nation proclaimed May 22 as "The International Biodiversity Day (IBD)" to increase awareness on issues related to biodiversity and its conservation. The day was first designated to be celebrated on December 29th when the Convention on Biological Diversity (CBD) came into force in 1993. The date was later shifted to May 22nd in the year 2000 in order to commemorate the adoption of the Convention on May 22nd, 1992 at the Rio Earth Summit. Since then,IBD is celebrated throughout the world with a specific theme for each year. The theme for 2015 was "Biodiversity for the Sustainable Development" to reflect the importance of effort made to establish a set of Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) as part of the UN post-2015 development agenda for the period of 2015-2030 and the relevance of biodiversity for the achievement of sustainable development.



The Department of Zoology, Sikkim University also celebrated IBD on 22 May 2015. DrBhoj. K. Acharya, a faculty of the Department briefed the students about the importance of biodiversity and their conservation needs. He also highlighted the three objectives of the CBD i.e. conservation of biological diversity, its sustainable use and fair and equitable sharing of benefits arising out of the use of biological resources. The Students were also introduced to the conservation approaches adopted by the world nations and India which include United Nations Convention on Biodiversity and its objective, Indian Biodiversity Act 2002 and its rules 2004.

As part of the programme, final year students of the department accompanied by the faculty visited Himalayan Zoological Park, Bulbulay, Gangtok. In the field, we learned techniques of bird identification and census. The team made observation on birds along the road and inside the park and identified around 25 species of birds. The students were also exposed to studying animal behaviour in both natural and artificial habitat. The students observed the feeding behaviour of Ashy Drongo(Bird) and Red Panda (mammal) in the zoological park. The field visit ended with a final remark from our teacher speaking about the importance of the day and emphasizing the contribution of the students in conserving the biodiversity.

"Apna sthan Apni Safai Apni Jimedari" Cleanliness Drive Organised by the Deptt of Zoology



The Department of Zoology organized a cleanliness event on 02 May 2015 from 10.30pm. Despite being a Saturday and a non working day, all the faculty members and the students enthusiastically participated. At first we cleaned the laboratory extensively. The question of women and democracy as also the question of democracy and disorder in the Northeast dominated the Conference but there was also a fair bit of variety with papers on women participation in Telangana movement and democracy and politics of language identity in Sikkim.

The Conference witnessed a serious exchange of ideas and experiences at various sites and locations. The valedictory speech was delivered by Prof. DyutishChakrabarty and the conference ended with giving away of certificates of participation.

Workshop on 'A Psycho Social Inquiry... Cont.

The workshop was graced by Shri P. D. Rai, Hon'ble Member of Parliament as the Chief Guest; Dr. K. Bhandari, Director cum Secretary of Health and Family Welfare; Prof T. B. Subba, Hon'ble Vice-Chancellor; Registrar Shri T.K. Kaul and Shri Akshay Sachdeva, Inspector General of Police, Sikkim Police. The key note address "Aligning with the UN post 2015 Agenda: Strategies to increase Mental Health and Well Being", was delivered by Prof Rashmi Jaipal, Professor Emeritus and Cross Cultural Psychologists, Member of American Psychological Association at United Nations.

The content of the workshop focused on a needs assessment, clarification of roles and responsibilities, coordination of strategies and interventions, and identification of resources current and required, and the gaps thereof. It brought multiple stakeholders together for the first time (universities, researchers, Health officials, NGOs, teachers, doctors, faculty, students, nurses, police, and media) to hear about each other's programs so that they can learn what resources are already available. The workshop leads to agreement on priority research and interventions at many levels, and a project to sustain longer-term effort. This is also very much in line with the WHO 2013 Mental Health Action Plan goal of reducing global suicide rates by 2020.
