## **Third Convocation Ceremony of Sikkim University**



The Third Convocation Ceremony of Sikkim University was held on 9 November, 2015 at Chintan Bhawan. The solemn occasion was graced by the presence of the Hon'ble Chancellor of Sikkim University, Justice (Smt). Ruma Pal, Vice Chancellor, Professor Dr. T. B. Subba, Registrar, Shri T. K. Kaul, members of the Executive Council, Academic Council and Finance Committee of Sikkim University, eminent dignitaries, proud parents of gold and silver medallists, friends from print and electronic media and all members of the university fraternity. The Chief Rector of the university, Hon'ble Governor of Sikkim, Shri Sriniwas Patil could not be present due to prior family commitments but had sent his blessings for the occasion. Professor Pratap Bhanu Mehta, who was supposed to chair the Third Convocation Ceremony as Chief Guest, could not be present due to the sudden aggravation of an illness. His Convocation Address was read out by the Controller of Examinations, Sikkim University, Dr. Debasish Choudhury. Professor Mehta, President and Chief Executive of the Centre for Policy Research, New Delhi, and a political scientist by profession, having taught at Harvard University, the New York University School of Law and Jawaharlal Nehru University, highlighted in his address, the prime responsibilities of students as citizens of the country. He envisioned young graduates from Sikkim University to be ambassadors in a new fight for freedom, while reimagining India as a new zone of freedom. Madam Chancellor, Justice (Smt.) # **Special Lecture** at the History Department



As part of the Special Lecture Series, the Department of History had an interesting and thought provoking lecture by Dr. Bodh Prakash, who teaches English Literature at Zakir Hussain College, Delhi. The lecture was held on 7th October 2015 at 10 am in the

Seminar hall of the Department. Dr Bodh Prakash delivered a talk on 'Gender Violence in Partition Literature'. His lecture covered literature on partition ranging from early partition literature like Krishan Chandev's Hum Veshi Hai, Ramand Sagar's Aur Insan Mar Gaya and Hayatula Snsari's Lahu ke Khoon to later works like those of Manto, Bhisham Sahni and Yashpal, who have written mainly about violence of partition. The talk also touched upon the 'Sita Myth' as depicted in certain novels. Works of authors like Amrita Pritam, Jyotirmoyee Debi and Joginder Pal were discussed in order to bring out the imaginative construct of gender violence during and after the partition years. After the lecture there was an interactive session where the audience comprising of students from various departments asked questions and interacted with Dr. Bodh Prakash.

## **Brainstorming session: Horticulture**

A brainstorming session on Indian Citrus Industry was organized by Dept. of Horticulture at ATIC Conference Hall, CAEPHT, CAU, Ranipool on 15 November, 2015. As the productivity of mandarins is declining, it is a matter of great concern for citrus growers and scientists. The objective of organizing this session was to find out exact problems of decline in productivity of Citrus sp. and measures to solve it. Dr. N. K. Krishna Kumar, Deputy Director General, Indian Council of Agricultural Research, New Delhi graced the occasion as Chief Guest. Dr. D.R. Singh, Director, NRC Orchids, Dr. R.K. Awasthe, Joint Director, ICAR Sikkim Centre, Tadong, Dr. P.C. Tripathi, Principal Scientist, Chaitali Research Station, Indian Institute of Horticultural Research, Officials from Dept. of Agriculture, Govt. of Sikkim, Dr. P.K.

Srivastava, Dean, CAEPHT, Ranipool and faculty members from CAEPHT, ICAR KVK, State Govt. KVKs, faculty members from Uttar Banga Krishi Vishwavidyalaya Hill Campus, Kalimpong, officials from SAMETI, Sikkim Supreme, NERAMAC, SIMFED, farmers from Kalimpong, faculty members and students from Dept. of Horticulture, Sikkim University also participated in the brainstorming session. There were thorough discussions on various reasons for citrus decline in north-eastern part of the country and possible ways to mitigate the problem. The production, processing and marketing aspects of Citrus sp. were discussed. Two publications of NRC Orchids, Pakyong i.e. "Directory of Orchid Growers", "Postharvest Technology of Cymbidium and Dendrobium sp." were also released by DDG. The programme was presided over by Prof. T.B. Subba, Hon'ble Vice-Chancellor,

# 8th All India Conference of China Studies



The 8th All India Conference of China Studies was organized by the Department of Chinese, Sikkim University in collaboration with the Institute of Chinese Studies, Delhi with support from ICSSR, Delhi and NERC Shillong from 5-7 November at Hotel Sikkim Retreat. The theme of this conference was "Regionalism and Sub-regional Multilateralism".



The hosting of the 8th AICCS in Sikkim has been a significant event for both the people of this region as well as members of academia. The fact that Sikkim is one of the most strategically located regions, not only within the Indian geopolitical space but also within the larger territorial domain of south and southeast Asia, and that an intellectual engagement of the stature of the Annual All India Conference of China Studies was planned here in Sikkim, this conference was able to create unprecedented opportunities for exploring avenues for academic

Sikkim University. Prof. Subba informed the esteemed members that Dept. of Horticulture is one of the best departments of Sikkim University and 50 acres of land has been allocated to Dept. of Horticulture at Yangang Campus. He further added that it would be desirable if Dept. of Horticulture, Sikkim University is made part of ICAR network project. Few recommendations of the brainstorming session are that strict quarantine should be followed for Citrus sp., nursery growers should take care of certified planting material while purchasing or selling, for Phytophthora control, rootstocks like Alemow, Jatti Khatti, Rangpur lime etc. should be used, problems should be categorized agroclimatic zone wise, establishment of good biocontrol

conversation on issues related to trans-border negotiations across disciplines. The inaugural session on 5 November was graced by Madam Mohini Menon and Shri Shivshankar Menon, Chairperson ICS Advisory Board, former National Security Advisor and former Ambassador to China and Israel as the Chief Guests, chaired by the Registrar, Sikkim University, Shri T. K. Kaul and attended by students and faculty members all across disciplines and departments. Shri Menon shared few of his thoughts on the status of Chinese Studies in the country in general, and on the research initiatives in particular. He recollected the period in time, during the early decades of the fifties and sixties, had the research focus much upon reviving the ancient ties between India and China, which in the later few decades of the century, shifted to more military strategy based concerns for both the countries. He welcomed more active engagement in Classical Chinese studies wherein ways could be paved towards a broader understanding between the people of the two countries of India and China. Professor Alka Acharya, Director and Senior Faculty of the Institute of Chinese Studies, promised all support to teachers and students of the young department of any research assistance as might be required in whatever capacity possible.

laboratory, right identification of fruit fly species, micro-nutrient spray, colour charts for identification of pests, pre-cooling facility, establishment of good mother stock, good processing facilities etc. It was suggested by DDG that similar meeting should be conducted every two years to take stock of the situation. A coordinated effort of scientific organizations and extension agencies is expected to be there for mitigating the problem of citrus decline in north eastern part of the country. A formal vote of thanks was delivered by Dr. S. Manivannan, Associate Professor and Head, Sikkim University. The session was followed by field visit to nearby citrus orchard and Dept. of Horticulture, Sikkim University.

## Traditional Health Care System in Sikkim

Ethnically diverse Sikkim doctrines the aboriginal religious practices, culminates indigenous folk traditions associated with religion and faith based healing therapies. The faith healers and occupational folk medicine therapeutics act as alchemists. The historic events have

played a pivotal role in creating such social mosaic assorted with cultural ramifications. Since the primeval days indigenous



knowledge of herbs based panacea is conceded by tradition to the present day. Despite the advancements in medical sciences, faith of the people in the traditional healing practices is robust. It coexists with biomedicine. Still today the urban rural Sikkimese populace approaches traditional healers for curing their ailments.

The traditional medicines include all kinds of folk, unconventional medicines, any therapeutic methods of mind and body. The traits of both the naturalistic and personality based system of traditional care prevails in Sikkim. The traditional health care system enunciates theories of disease aetiology and arbitration within a larger cultural framework of moral, ethical, religious and supernatural concerns. When the afflictions do not heal, when a sickness does not respond to treatment, and when the normally expected and predictable does not happen, supernatural explanations are sought. They are locally available treatments contributing mostly to the primary health care with considerably low cost. Unfortunately,

these medicines and therapies are not yet codified, but are widely shared between users and practitioners. The traditional healers are unlicensed.


The Healers

Bhutia religion includes primordial tradition of shamanism. By far the most potent method of driving out spirits is

> exorcism. There are host of illnesses which are believed to be caused by evil spirits. These are mostly treated by ritual

specialists or magico-religious healer. Diagnosis and propitiation is carried out by the Mun/Bonthing (Exorcist). Mun gives no medicine, nor prescribes the necessary charms and amulets. The Mun mediates between human, supernatural and natural. The therapeutic rituals as practiced by them tend to focus on symbolically encouraging and assisting the putatively natural course of the sickness or on transferring it away from the patient's body, rather than on "treatment" or "cure" in specific sense.

Shamanism in the Tibetan culture has a



long and complex history. The Bhutia shaman is Pau whose primary function is to cure illness. Paus, Lamas and monks all perform exorcist rituals. Paus and Lamas do similar curing rituals with very similar structures. But, the Pau's work is never considered religious and the Lama's work is not considered exorcism. Bhutia Paus are capable of seeing spirits in a state of trance. They induce spirits and deities to come and speak through their mouth, diagnose disease and suggest required ritual or sacrifice in order to relieve misery.

Contemporary healing practices in

in this regard.

For instance, the Lepchas construe illness is something that is caused by Mung of envy, hatred and quarrelling. If it is annoyed by actions of the offenders it afflicts them with various ailments. They also believe that people born in different years are distressed by specific Mung. Accidents, disability, diseases are readily explained by holding some elements of supernatural or another responsible for.



Sikkim are catered to by the variety of practitioners from domestic, village level healers to the monastic healers. An important role is played by oracular or shamanic healers, by amchis and biomedical practitioners. Amchi is officially sanctioned as a component of the public health system in Sikkim, and provided with the funds for clinical operations and training programmes. Disease: Perception & Strategies

Every culture has its particular explanation for ill health guided by social mores defined by religion based on values, symbols and practices with a distinction between natural and super natural existence. Traditional healing comprises of beliefs and practices. Ethnicity provides for different notions On a similar trend, the Bhutias perceive sickness is induced by black magic, Shinde and Nazar. The majority of Bhutia rituals are connected with combating the various evil beings and the modes of dealing with them are almost as diverse and numerous as the type of evil beings themselves. In one kind of ritual, the Bhutias invoke Pho Lha (Gods), give them offerings and ask them to join their side in getting rid of the of the offending spirits. When the Deh (Evil spirits) experience how powerful their side is, they go away. While in another kind, evil spirits are asked what they need to satisfy them and their wish is fulfilled.

fact that hills and uplands pose unique challenges which hinder our quest for overall prosperity and development. Globally we have been confronting the challenges of geographical isolation, topography and related issues since ages. Available data gives us picture of this global concern. Hills and uplands occupy about one fourth of global terrestrial area and twenty per cent of world human population lives in these landscapes. Half of the world's population depends either directly or indirectly on the resources of hill regions especially for water and rare biodiversity based products. According to the report of UNEP's Millennium Environment Assessment (2005) "both poverty and ethnic diversity are higher in mountain regions and people are often more vulnerable than people elsewhere. Ninety per cent of the global mountain population i.e. 1.2 billion people live in developing countries and countries in transition-with one third of these in China and half in Asia-Pacific region. Some 90 million mountain people and almost everyone living above 2500 metres live in poverty and are considered especially vulnerable to food insecurity. High lands are commonly characterized by undulating topography, mostly acidic soils with high soil erosion, inaccessibility of most part and poor communication reach etc. Moreover, the other challenge lies in the fact that, most of the people are impoverished. Guest of Honour Dr. M. Anandaraj earlier said for successful organic mission potential of microbes should be properly explored. Further he sought visions from Governor so that research institutes can work in that direction.

## Traditional Health Care System...

Healing.

Self or home treatment is usually the first step in medical care, consisting primarily of concoctions of herbs, barks of trees, flowers, roots, leaves, seeds, etc. and change in diet. It is a set of concepts of health and illness that reflect certain values, traditions and beliefs based on people's way of life. Mostly, indigenous system of health care based on herbs and ritual care are sought. Charms, amulets and incantations are also used by Lepcha-Bhutia to bring about cures of different diseases. Once the cause of the disease is found, the patient consults the practitioner accordingly. They are recommended by the ritual specialists to ward off evil spirits and prevent diseases. Treatment could be from herbs, Tibetan pharmacopoeia and/or within the context of magico-religious healing contained by indigenous framework. The locals rely on lamas and traditional healers like Mun, Bonthing, Jhankris in case of sickness and resort to the Primary Health Centers when all other means have failed.

Inference

In milieu to the traditional health care prevailing in Sikkim the "patient" performs a very important "social function and validates the system by calling into play the group sentiments and symbolic representation to have them" which embodies the real experience. For the traditional healers, the mind, the body and the experiential field are considered as one. They are traditional healers who can be interpreted as the healers of mind, body as well as the community.

Among the people of Sikkim, a sequence of resort does not seem to exist, although the trend is to begin with home remedies to a traditional healer to a biomedical doctor, as the course of illness proceeds and becomes more serious. When a person is sick, she/he or her/his family members are primarily interested in getting her/his health restored, for which they unhesitatingly combine different treatments irrespective of their ontological, epistemic, moral and aesthetic foundation.
